Director's Message

This years Festival is even more of an omnium gatherum than last year, but at least in its variety it certainly cannot be described as toujours perdrix.



The thread that runs through the Festival is Voices: who is speaking in literature—the author, the character, the public?-why are they speaking, through spontaneous inspiration as at Pentecost, for social conscience, for beauty's sake, for revenge, to entertain or to make money? Using this theme, it is our aim to build on last year's success in presenting a festival with accent on the creative integrity of contemporary literature: it is significant that the Festival enjoys the distinction of being opened by Dr. Alastair Niven (1), Director of Literature for the Arts Council of Great Britain. Contemporary Poetry figures strongly, as in last year. This year there is an emphasis on the setting of poetry to music, both in the Grieg Event, Echoes from the Fjords (39), and in George Newson's Songs for the Turning Year (9); and on the fun and vitality of Poetry in Performance, with Celtic Voices (II), Reels Unlimited (23) and Michael Horovitz' Two Heats of Kent Poetry Olympics (51, 53). The Writer-in-Residence makes a welcome return this year in the person of Nicki Jackowska, novelist and poet. A new departure is to extend the residency concept in two ways: by having the actors of Simply Theatre appearing through the week for adults and for children in a varied programme of workshops, dramatic storytelling and theatre, ending with the Saturday performance of Lopez de

Vega's Apples (52); and secondly, this year the Festival becomes a lively debating ground: many of the events bring together two or more authors, and our Writer-in-Residence and members of the National Artistic Advisory Panel and myself will be hosting most of the events. We hope that our public will enjoy talking with and sharing the experience of the Festival informally with this Festival family and of seeing familiar faces throughout the week.

The Festival is also presenting an exciting day in France, KLF in France, thanks to an excellent collaboration with Tendances and the Université du Littoral. Another new initiative is the Conference Poetry Alive! organised under the Festival banner by Maggi Waite, Principal Librarian, Young People's Services, for Kent's Arts & Libraries, from 5 to 7 November in Ramsgate, and Parcel of Poets in schools and communities throughout October. This sets the precedent for the Festival activities outside the specific Festival week and shows how the Festival can itself play a creative role: we hope to promote another Seminar at national level in the Spring on the role of Libraries.


The international note continues in the focus on Norway, thanks to Michael Meyer's Ibsen and the Theatre of Today (38), the fascinating evening of music and words put together by Robert Matthew Walker featuring the music of Grieg (performed not only by a Norwegian soprano of distinction and by one of Britain's greatest pianists and his wife but by Grieg and his wife Nina themselves). The complementary relationship with the other arts continues through showing Picasso's illustrations to the Histoire Naturelle of Buffon and Anca lonescu's illustrations to the challenging novels of the great Norwegian novelist Hamsun.

The power of the purse has again been taken into consideration by extending the very successful discount packages offered last

year, though with a different pattern (indicated thus). We are extending some of the Two - in - Ones to include a whole evening's entertainment, as well as offering a Festival Season Ticket that gives admittance to all and any events at the Metropole (except workshops).

Desert Island Books continues to present well-known figures in an informal breakfast ambience: judging from last year's response and this year's personalities, we will be using the main Gallery to accommodate the numbers. Sunday's Closing Events (54, 55) feature Flashman's creator, George MacDonald Fraser, and,thanks to the BBC, private eye Marlowe Investigates Marlowe, with a highly expert commentary from authors Robin Chapman, Della Hilton and Charles Nicholl.

The 1992 pilot collaboration with Kent County Council Arts and Libraries has been extended very successfully. Indeed, the collaboration between the Metropole Arts Centre Trust, Shepway District Council and Kent County Council with the Metropole Arts Centre as the catalyst shows the way forward for arts provision in Britain. But I must thank not only these two Councils, but also the private sector sponsors of the Festival and the South East Arts Board; and I am particularly grateful to the Festival's Advisory Panels, both Artistic and Management—to say nothing of my French colleague Patric Dréhan, Director of the Festival de la Côte d'Opale, and Channel Arts Link. And the warmest of thanks must go to the person whose dedication above all has helped to build the Festival over the years, Ann Fearey. Without such contributions, the Festival would not be the artistic and regional force to be reckoned with that it is. But as a performer I can say with experience that it is you, our participating audience, that make success come alive: the KLF lives because of you.



In Residence

Simply Theatre Company in Residence

Simply Theatre is a professional touring company based in Bath. Formed in 1992, and incorporated as an Actors' Co-operative Company that year, it tours extensively with both its main theatre work and its educational work.

Simply Youth Theatre and Simply Youth Dance Theatre run regular weekend workshops as well as long summer ones. The company performs regularly in the south of England and in Wales, and works closely with education authorities in bringing the written word to life.

Novelist and poet Nicki has been published widely over the past twenty years, including three novels and five collections of poetry. In addition to giving frequent readings of her work and appearing in many anthologies, Nicki is an experienced creative writing tutor. She was Writer in Residence at the Brighton Festival from 1987 to 1989, has worked for universities and education authorities and runs her own Writing School. She has recently completed a new novel, Finding Him, and a book on language, Write for Life. Of her novel, The Islanders, Barry Unsworth wrote "The beauty and energy of the writing take this novel far out of the common run. Nicki Jackowska has an original and distinctive vision."

The Exhibitions

This year's exhibitions continue the pattern set in 1992 of mounting visual arts exhibitions that are complementary or inspired by literature. Thanks to the National Touring Exhibitions Department of the South Bank Centre, the Festival will host the series of etchings which Picasso created to accompany Buffon's classic text, Histoire Naturelle. This is considered by many to be one of Picasso's most important graphic works, while the text by the 18th century French naturalist, George Louis Leclerc de Buffon, is a classic of French literature. The thirty-one prints employ a virtuosity of techniques, lift-ground aquatint, etching and dry point, that brings Buffon's text to life. The series was begun in 1936 for the publisher, Ambroise Vollard, and was eventually published by Martin Fabiani in 1942, in a limited edition of 226. The publisher added relevant passages to accompany the etchings, a return to early days of the illustrated printed book, when wood block prints were accompanied by captions, as, for example, in the work of Albrecht Dürer. Animals appear frequently in Picasso's work, most importantly



personal significance. This is evident in his Guernica painting of 1937, contemporary with the project. The bull is the only subject to be treated twice in *Histoire Naturelle*.



The Romanian artist, Anca Ionescu, has led a life of challenge and turmoil, both within the pressures of twentieth century Romania, where she was brought up and trained at the University of Bucharest, and in leaving her native country. Famous for her work in pastels, engravings and drawings in particular, her work is seen in Paris, London, Norway, New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Japan, with a very full schedule of exhibitions since she came to live in Paris, in 1975, and subsequently London in 1979. Her sense of atmosphere, her own experiences and her remarkable technique, have given expression to her empathy with the challenging works of the Norwegian writer, Kurt Hamsun. The illustrations for Mysteries are etchings after the original pen and ink drawings: those for Growth of the Soil are in dry point on copper, worked directly onto the plate. The works were completed between 1987 and 1990. Also on view will be the manuscripts of the poems that George Newson has set in his new work Songs for the Turning Year (9). These are manuscripts by Fred Ball (What Is Love?), George Macbeth (Always), John Wain

(After Sonnet 116), George Mackay Brown Start OF Every Wandering Barque), Peter Po (A Working From Shakespeare — Sonnet 116 Peter Redgrove (Love Is Not Love Which Alte When It Alteration Finds), Penelope Shuttle (Reservoir Of The Mirror), Edwin Morgan (Variations Of Sonnet 116), Leonard Smith (Candour) and Patric Dickinson (Nothing Car On Love Impose).





This programme commemorates the birth of Wilfred Owen on March 18, 1893, and the 75th anniversary of his death on November 4, 1918. It is drawn mainly from letters to his family – especially those to his mother, to whom he wrote virtually daily for long periods; and to his great inspirer and encourager, Siegfried Sassoon.

The great flowering of his creativity lay between 1917 and his death. These poems have moved the consciences of generations, with a vivid and moving picture of the horrors of war.





Realism means more than characters who are credible, a plot that is plausible and dialogue that bears a resemblance to human conversation. Eliot, Bennett



and Lawrence all wrote in a way which revealed the spirit of their age – the hopes, aspirations, prejudices and fears of real people. "What", asks Roy Hattersley, "has happened to realism in English fiction?"

A former cabinet minister and deputy leader of the Labour Party, **Hattersley** is also a prolific writer. In addition to regular contributions to *The Spectator*, *The Listener* and *The Guardian* he has written four books of essays, the autobiographical memoirs of his childhood and a biography of Admiral Nelson. Most recently he has completed a trilogy of historical novels – *The Maker's Mark, In That Quiet Earth* and *Skylark's Song* – based on the lives of the families of his parents during the late 19th and early 20th centiuries.

Christine Tobin established an enormous reputation in her native Ireland before moving to London. Through LAMMAS she has explored her Celtic musical background,



working with Don on setting traditional songs in a contemporary harmonic context whilst preserving the vocal inflections of the folk tradition.

Mike Donaghy, a New Yorker, was Poetry Editor of the Chicago Review. He moved to England in 1955 and four years later won the Whitbread Award for Poetry. In 1990 he won the Geoffrey Faber Memorial Prize. Mike has a long involvement with traditional Irish music and is a fine flute and bodhran (Irish frame-drum) player.
