DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Something New

Sixteen years ago, the Kent Literature Festival blazed a new path. Today there is a plethora of literature festivals in Britain, alike in programming, a travelling table d'hôte of authors. So this year's Festival celebrates something different. The book is no longer the only means of communicating the essence of great literature. Classic novels and contemporary writing are becoming known through the medium of the screen, the radio and the musical: in other words, in adaptation. Does this offer heightened awareness, greater impact? Or is to adapt to depreciate the coin of true writing? How do you prefer your story, written, or seen and heard? Whatever your answers, adaptation, and writing for the new 20th century media, has become big business, and a highly skilled one at that. Creativity is called for from the team, often huge, of all those involved: financial investment is immense.

The most famous and expert people in this field will explore what goes into this new artistic discipline, how it is done, why it is done. And the 1994 Festival is bang up-to-date. Most of us have seen *Middlemarch*, and we are also featuring the BBC's new autumn blockbuster, *Martin Chuzzlewit*, and -a coup -a one-off special Festival preview of some episodes of Ruth Rendell's new television mystery *Vanity Dies Hard*. The programmes come alive with examples; the evenings promise to be provocative, with your participation; and we shall have some first-hand anecdotes.

Theatrical

Throughout, there is the taste of theatre. Richard Baker features in a musical version of Hans Andersen's *The Steadfast Tin Soldier*. Maria Callas shares her intimate thoughts with us: Falstaff looks back on his life and valiant deeds, thanks to the Royal Shakespeare Company and actor David Weston; the maverick John Kennedy Melling, a walking encyclopedia, tells the inside story of great sleuths in 3D; the one and only Johnny Morris gives us his songs and poems inspired by Saint-Saens' *Carnival of Animals*. The ever-popular Desert Island Books reveals the person behind the persona - Sandy Gall, Michael Shea, Julian Symons, Lord Brabourne (whose company created the screen masterpiece of E.M. Forster's *Passage to India*). The Rev. Nick Stacey.

Kent County Council's contribution to the literary scene is represented by an exhibition from their year-round Cover to Cover project for schools, and Simon Lycett shows us how he created the wonderful floral designs for Four Weddings and a Funeral.

Who better to open such a Festival than the famous Michael Frayn? He is not only a doyen of British writers with an immense list of successes behind him — Three Best Comedy of the Year Awards, to say nothing of Best Play of the Year, an Emmy Award and such films as Clockwise (with Cleese), Noises Off and this year, A Landing on the Sun — but a wonderfully amusing and acute speaker.





Ferdinand the Bull tells the story of a charming, flower-struck young bull who comes face-to-face with the Bull Ring.

This zoological Camival of Camille ("I live in music like a fish in water") Saint-Säens is a miracle of humour and craftsmanship. His Parisian impudence, in-jokes (The Tortoise is the Can-Can at quarter-speed) and moving seriousness are matched by Johnny Morris' unique brand of creativity, as poet and songster.

Johnny Morris is one of this century's greatest and most individual performers in true comedy. He began his working life as a solicitor's clerk in Newport, Monmouthshire. After a time in London working on building sites he moved to Wiltshire to work on a 2,000 acre farm. He has scarcely moved from that part England save to make travel films in various parts of the world. His first radio broadcast was in 1946: he ventured into the television world in the early 50's. His long association with farm animals (remember Animal Magic) convinced him that homo sapiens was not anything like as superior as he thought he was. As a child he played the violin and studied singing. This musical training persuaded him to write stories and lyrics which were set to music. The improbable titles of these, such as Delilah the Sensitive Cow and Juanita the Spanish Lobster, indicate that they are not to be taken too seriously. He has been awarded an OBE.

A British Duo with a difference, York 2 (husband and wife John and Fiona) have appeared throughout Europe and North America, and on BBC, Austrian Radio, Canadian TV and Radio, giving concerts in unusual venues - on a boat on the Great Lakes, in costume in Edwardian soirées, marathon events lasting all night in Austria, gala concerts on six Steinways at Eltham Palace. They have commissioned several new works: their first CD (London Hall) contains

works: their list CD (London Ffall) contains some of these. A second CD features The Planets (world première recording of the duet version) and *The Rite of Spring*.

Events so far include location writing, poetry and art workshops, storytelling, making books, a sculpture based on a book written by a group of children and a play written as a follow on from a school production of *Midsummer Night's Dream*. In all 28 events took place for the Summer term and more than 60 are booked for Autumn 1994 and Spring 1995.

To give the widest possible exposure to Kent's young writers and illustrators we have arranged a series of displays and exhibitions across the County. We are pleased to be able to announce that the Kent Literature Festival will host one of these.

Colin Rogers is Controller of Drama for Meridian Broadcasting and Director of the production company, Deco Films and Television. He has been Head of Scripts for HTV and BBC Deputy Head of Drama Series and Serials: his experience spans comedy, plays, films, drama series and children's programmes. Indeed, in many ways, he could be said to be the *Eminence Grise* of this Festival, his second KLF:


