

Elizabeth Buchan spent a year behind the scenes in the City researching before writing her latest novel *Against Her Nature* a novel set in and around the insurance and reinsurance world of Lloyd's. Among

her published works are a profile of Beatrix Potter for children, Daughters of the Storm, which is set in Revolutionary France and Light of the Moon, a story of a female SOE agent in Occupied France. Elizabeth's third-prizewinning novel Consider the Lily has been an international bestseller and her forth novel, Perfect Love, received widespread attention and excellent reviews. 'Buchan reaches the parts other writers don't even know about', said the Daily Mail.

Elizabeth reviews for *The Times, The Mail* on *Sunday* and other national papers, has written a series of gardening columns for *BBC Homes and Antiques Magazine*, and

is this year's Chairman of the Betty Trask Award and a judge for the 1997 Whitbread Awards. She has recently completed her two year term as Chairman of the Romantic Novelists Association.



Norma Curtis' first book Living It Up, Living It Down, (Harper Collins) won the RNA New Writers Award and was chosen for the 1995 W H Smith's Fresh Talent Promotion. Her second novel Quality Time came out in 1996 and her latest novel, The Last Place you Look will be published in July 1998.



Christina Jones' second novel *Running The Risk* (published Festival week) has been chosen as part of Orion's new Oriel Launch - with escalator panels on London Underground and Adshels in shopping

centres. Her first novel *Going The Distance* was chosen for the 1997 W.H. Smith Fresh Talent Promotion and her third book *Walking On Air* will be published in the spring. In 1995 her short story *Laying The Ghost* won a Maureen Lipman Humour Award.

The Romantic Novelists Association was founded over thirty years ago to raise the profile of romantic fiction and to encourage new writers in the tradition. The RNA is a flourishing association with approximately 600 members, it organises the annual Romantic Novel of the Year Award, which is held at the Cafe Royal and attracts a huge amount of media attention. Winners have included Joanna Trollope, Reay Tannahill, Charlotte Bingham, Rosamund Pilcher and Sue Gee. In addition the RNA runs the New Writers' Scheme which gims to help and encourage new authors many of whom have gone on to feature regularly in the bestseller list.

Deborah Maggach has written a dozen novels, including *Porky, The Stand-In, The Ex-Wives, Seesaw* and, most recently, *Close Relations*. Practically everything she has written has been abridged or adapted for broadcast, especially on Radio 4's Woman's Hour and The Book At Bedime. She has also written a stage play and number of TV screenplays, including the prize-winning *Goggle-Eyes*. Her collections of short stories, *Smile* and *Changing Tables* have been widely anthologised.



How do you get background, characterization and plot into a text of 500 words suitable for five year-olds, or a 2,500 word picture book for 5-7 year olds? How do these differ from a 10,000 word story for 8-10's? How do you find an idea, think up characters and construct a plot. How much of the story can be told through illustrations and where do you find an artist, a publisher and an agent? This workshop will include written

book writer for over 30 years. Her second book The Ghosts was a best seller which has been made into a film The Amazing Mr Blunden and is currently being adapted as a stage musical. Since then she has written fifteen more books, including another bestseller, The Mousehole Cat, which has been made into a video and stage musical, Catkin, Tales From Grimm, Tales From the Ballet and Snow-White and Rose-Red. Antonia's work has been shortlisted for awards including the Carnegie Medal (twice) and The Smarties Prize. She won The British Bok Award (Illustrated Children's Book of the Year) for The Mousehole Cat. Her latest book, Noah and the Ark is published Festival week.

WORKSHOP: WRITING FOR RADIO

with actor, broadcaster, writer and producer HOWARD LEADER -"Theatre of the mind"



In his "Theatre of the Mind" workshop. Howard Leader will be explaining some of the techniques radio writers employ, how some of them may take on the role of an imaginary producer or director when creating their work and how that work comes "off the page" and onto the tape which will ultimately broadcast the piece.

He will be considering different styles and applications for audio writing, and unvailing the mysteries of production technique. How far can you go to create the image you would wish to in the listener's mind, where must you draw the line in purely practicl terms, producer guidelines, taste and decency and of course the chance to have a crack at writing a short audio drama.

Howard is best known to television audiences for his work as co-presenter of the BBC's "That's Life!" programme. Radio listeners will have heard him as an actor in dramatised documentaries on Radio 2, as a reporter on features programmes on Radio 4 and as a regular presenter of BBC Radio Kent. His televison acting credits include four years in the BBC's comedy series "Allo Allo" and he appears regularly in plays and musicals on stages across the country.

Howard makes regular special feature productions for the BBC.

This story of the disastrous marriage between the Prince and Princess of Wales ended in near-farce when the

latter was refused admittance to her estranged husband's

Coronation as King George IV. It has been acclaimed, like her first book on Emma Hamilton, as a brilliant and sympathetic study of a woman elevated to the highest ranks of Society. whose



subsequent rejection cast both women into disgrace and poverty. She will discuss the challenges and rewards of writing such biographies with John Miller.

John Miller is a writer and broadcaster who has specialised in historical and theatrical subjects. He has collaborated with Sir John Gielgud on his memoirs for radio, television, and two accompanying books, the second of these, "Acting Shakespeare", is to be republished in an expanded version in paperback in October. His biography of Sir Ralph Richardson is now available in paperback, and on audio-cassette with Martin Jarvis.

An Evening with

JOHN JULIUS

Readings from Christmas Crackers

Every Christmas for the last 27 years John Julius Norwich has been producing - as a sort of glorified Christmas card - a short miscellany which he calls A Christmas Cracker. Its twenty four contributors vary from Lord Nelson to Evelyn Waugh; their subjects range from the Papacy to pig-sticking, the culinary preparation of puffins to the worstever novel.

John Julius 2nd Viscount Norwich is the son of the statesman and diplomat Alfred Duff Cooper (1st Viscount) and the Lady Diana Cooper. After taking a degree in French and Russian at New College, Oxford, he spent twelve years in H.M. Foreign Service. In 1964 he resigned to become a writer.

He first wrote two books on the medieval Norman Kingdom of Sicily, The Normans in the South and The Kingdom in the Sun. They were followed by two travel books, Mount Athos (with Reresby Sitwell) and Sahara; A History of Venice, and The Architecture of Southern England; Fifty Years of Glynebourne; and an anthology, A Taste for Travel. In 1988 came Byzantium; The Early Centuries, the first part of a three-volume history of the Byzantine Empire. The second and third volumes, Byzantium: The Apogee and Byzantium; The Decline and Fall. were published in 1991 and 1995. He has been General Editor of Great Architecture of the World, The Italian World, The New Shell Guides to Great Britain and of The Oxford Illustrated Encyclopedia of Art.

On radio, Lord Norwich was for four years Chairman of the popular BBC panel game My Word, was a regular contestant in Round Britain Quiz and for three years presented the Evenina Concert six nights a week, on Classic FM. For television he has written and presented some thirty historical documentary films on subjects which include the Fall of Constantinople and Napoleon's Hundred Days. In 1985 he presented a series of three 50-minute



programmes designed to complement the Treasure Houses of Britain exhibition at the National Gallery of Art, Washington,

Formerly Chairman of Colnaghi, the oldest fine art dealers in London, Lord Norwich is Chairman of the Venice in Peril Fund. Co-chairman of the World Monuments Fund and Chairman of its British affiliate the World Monuments Fund in Britain, and Vice President of the National Association of Decorative and Fine Arts (NADFAS). He is a regular Lecturer on arthistorical, architechtural and musical subjects in Britain, Europe, North America and Australia. He is a Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts, the Royal Society of Literature, the Royal Geographical Society and the Society of Antiquaries, and is a Commendatore of the Ordine al Merito della Repubblica Italiana.

Alison Joseph is the creator of *Sister Agnes*, the streetwise contemorary Catholic nun, now making her appearance in her fourth novel, A Dark and Sinful Death. Previous navels are Sacred Hearts, The Hour of Our Death, and The Quick and the Dead. All are published by Headline.

Alison has worked in local radio, as a presenter and producer; she worked for a series of Channel 4 programmes as a director, before forming her own production company, Works on the Screen, with Sue Conte. Together they produced Through the Devil's Gateway, a series about women and religion, presented by Helen Mirren. A book of the series followed. Sister Agnes came into being as a idea sometime in November 1993, with her first mystery story. Sacred Hearts.

Annie Ross is the creator of Bel Carson, a spikey television director whose nose for a good news story leads her into trouble. She will be making her third appearance in Double Vision. Previous novels in the series are Moving Image



and Shot in the Dark, all published by Headline.

After gaining an honours degree in English Literature, Annie won a scholarship to study film and television production in the States. She worked there for several years, latterly as a director. Since returning to this country, she has directed a number of network programmes, including The Media Show, 999 Rescue and Strange But True. She has also produced several programmes for Dispatches through her own production comapny.

VENICE AND THE POETS

Aspects of Venetian palaces in a series of prints by Terence Warren that accompany selected texts by authors ranging from Byron and Ruskin to Goethe, Mann and Pound. The artist has visited Venice many times over the past 30 years. This collection of colour etchings and aquatints, involving the use of almost 60 separate copper plates, is the culmination of four years work and research.

Terence Warren has linked extracts from diaries, letters, poems and prose by some of the many writers who have fallen in love with Venice over the centuries, to his own impressions of the Venetian Palaces and buildings where the writers stayed.

This exhibition presents the artist's original watercolours alongside the prints, and several oil paintings inspired by Venetian themes. Individual works and sets of prints are for sale.

THE ART OF BIOGRAPHY

MICHAEL HOLROYD in conversation with PETER GUTTRIDGE

As a genre, biography has enduring and widespread appeal, with some 3,000 biographies published last year. But can a biography ever really come close to the truth of a subject's life?

Michael Holroyd is the pre-eminent contemporary biographer, the author of a biography of *Lytton Strachey* (the basis for the film Carrington) and a highly regarded biography of the bohemian artist *Augustus John* and an acclaimed multi-volume biography of *George Bernard Shaw* now available for the first time in e-single volume.

Michael is past Chairman of the Society of Authors and past President of English PEN. He has written a number of radio and television scripts and lectured abroad for the British Council.

In 1989 he was awarded the CBE for services to literature. He is married to Margaret Drabble and lives in London.

PERISCOPE PATROL: WANKLYN VC and the SAGA OF MALTA SUBMARINES

John will talk about his latest book *Periscope Patrol*, a story of how a handful of British submarines changed the course of World War II. It is also the story of perhaps the submariner supreme, David Wanklyn, the first submarine commander to be awarded the Victoria Cross.

John Frayn Turner served with the British Royal Navy, worked for a decade on Royal Air Force publicity; made numerous test flights of new aircraft; flew at twice the speed of sound

as long ago as 1963; and accompanied the famous Red Arrow aerobatic team. He has written twenty four books, mostly modern history and biography. As well as *Periscope Patrol*, several of his



other books have been on naval subjects: Service Most Silent, VC's of the Royal Navy, Battle Stations and A Girl Called Johnnie. His last book was a biography on Douglas Bader and selected as the London Evening Standard's Book of the Week. This internationally known author has just completed a major book on The Battle of Britain, due out next year.

Geoffrey Carr in The Price and Professor Edward Brett in Late Starter, Recently he has been in episodes of *Maigret* and *Heartbeat*. For his performances in the television version of Crown Matrimonial and Tom Stoppard's *Professional Foul* he has twice won the BAFTA Best Actor Award.
