Three books. Two poets. One desert island. Michael Curtis and Stuart Douch, who recently shared a literature residency at the Metropole accompany them to a distant desert island.





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





New Habits

in conversation with John Miller

WAS doomed love the real cause of the mutiny on the Bounty? Popular belief, spurred by countless books and three Hollywood films, paints Fletcher Christian as a hero, Captain William Bligh as a brutal and tyrannical captain and a happy ending on the remote Pacific island of Pitcairn.

ISABELLA tells a different story. It tells how Fletcher in fact returned to England, lived incognito and deliberately blackened Bligh's name to save his own. It also describes William Wordsworth's sinister role in the events following the mutiny.

Fiona will be talking to John Miller this afternoon about her novel, its startling revelations and the repercussions it may have on a legend which has romanced the world for over 200 years.

John Miller is a writer and broadcaster whose

interests are politics, history and theatre. He collaborated with John Gielgud on his memoirs and wrote the authorised biography of Ralph Richardson. His expanded edition of Judy Dench's biography will be published in November by Orion.

The FOUR QUARTETS is a collection of four long poems published separately between 1935 and 1942. Each is anchored firmly to a place, yet together they form a moving and beautiful sequence linked by the common themes and recurrent motifs.

BURNT NORTON (1935)
brings to life a country house in the Cotswolds.
EAST COKER (1940)

describes the Somerset village of Eliot's ancestors, his final resting place.

THE DRY SALVAGES (1941)

evokes images of America, particularly of Eliot's boyhood home in St Louis.

LITTLE GIDDING (1942)

tells the tale of a 17th century religious community destroyed by Cromwell and later - jubilantly - rebuilt.
