H.R.F. Keating is a crime writer and a novelist who has been crime book critic for The Times since 1967. He has twice won the Gold Dagger of the Crime Writers Association, most recently for The Murder of the Maharajah (Collins/Hamlyn) and in 1964 for the first of his 'Inspector Ghote' novels, The Perfect Murder (Collins/Hamlyn). His most recent book is Go West, Inspector Ghote (Collins). He is also the author of Sherlock Holmes, The Man and his World (Thames & Hudson) and he edited Agatha Christie: First Lady of Crime (Weidenfeld & Nicholson). Due in the autumn of 1982 is The Book of Crime and Suspense Fiction, a guide to mystery writing and mystery writers.

About the workshop H.R.F. Keating says: "A book that can be described as a thriller need not be cheap or slick. Devising one can provide contemplating writers with a skeleton, attractive to a wide readership, which gives them something firm on which to hang whatever they have to say. A thriller also stands a better chance of reaching a public."

10B 'THE SHORT STORY'

Tutor: Penelope Lively

Penelope Lively was born in Cairo and spent her childhood in Egypt. She came to England after the war and studied at Oxford. Her novels include The Road to Lichfield (Collins) which was shortlisted for the Booker Prize and Treasures of Time (Heinemann) which won an Arts Council Book Award. Her books for children include A Stitch in Time which won the Whitbread Award and Fanny (Puffin) due out this Autumn.



Her book of short stories Nothing
Missing But the Samovar
(Heinemann) won the Southern
Arts Literature Prize. A few months
ago her latest novel, Next to
Nature, Art (Heinemann) was
published to wide acclaim.

To introduce the workshop Penelope Lively says: "I hope to combine a practical exercise in short story writing with a discussion of technique, the strengths and problems of the short story etc. I shall probably suggest that members of the workshop spend some of the time working out an outline and drafting part of a story in response to a suggested theme or opening, and I would hope to end with a collective examination and discussion of what emerges. If people would like to bring along their work, I would also hope to read it and make suggestions."

Zoë Fairbairns is the author of four novels, including Benefits and Fruits, both published by Virago. She is poetry editor of Spare Rib magazine, a freelance journalist and actively involved in the women's liberation movement. Over the past few years she has run writing workshops both for women's groups and mixed groups, in colleges, schools and a prison. She is 33 and lives in London.

Melvyn Bragg was born in Wigton, Cumberland in 1939. He was educated locally and at Oxford, where he read Modern History. Since then he has made his living as a novelist and broadcaster.

His novels have been published to widespread acclaim and they include: For Want of a Nail, The Second Inheritance, Without a City Wall, The Hired Man, A Place in England, The Nerve, Josh Lawton, The Silken Net, Autumn Manoeuvres, A Christmas Child and Kingdom Come. He is also the author of Speak For England, an oral history of England since 1900.

Melvyn Bragg is also well known as an editor and presenter of television programmes. He originated, presented and edited the BBC paperback programme Read All About It and has contributed many features to the Lively Arts series. He is at present editing and presenting The South Bank Show – London Weekend's networked arts programme. As a screenwriter, he has written films including **Isadora**, **The Music Lovers** and **Jesus Christ Superstar**. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature.

Pete Morgan published his highly acclaimed first collection The Grey Mare Being the Better Steed in 1973 and from 1975-77 he was Fellow in Poetry at Loughborough University. **The Spring Collection** was published in 1979 and his poems have appeared in The Guardian, The Observer, British Book News, The Scotsman etc. In 1976 he was one of six British poets invited to tour the USA as part of the Bi-centennial celebrations. One Greek Alphabet (Ceolfrith Press) is Pete Morgan's latest collection of poems.

He edited the **Penguin Book of Light Verse** and his most recent collection is The New Ewart: Poems 1980-82 published by Hutchinson.

THE KENT LITERATURE FESTIVAL LECTURE

'BERNARD SHAW AND BIOGRAPHY' by Michael Holroyd

An extraordinary number and variety of biographies were written about George Bernard Shaw while he was alive. The writers of these ranged from an American mathematician to the notorious pomographer Frank Harris! – from G.K. Chesterton to Professor Joad of the BBC's 'Brains Trust'. By looking at the correspondence between Shaw and these writers and examining the manuscripts of their books, Michael Holroyd has come to the conclusion that to a large extent Shaw used them as a ventriloquist uses his dummy; he ghosted their narratives, rewrote his life as he went along



and with a masterly use of paradox, he used selfadvertisement as a form of self-concealment. The stories behind these books reveal much about Shaw himself and raises pertinent questions about the nature of biography.

Michael Holroyd has written biographies of Hugh Kingsmill (Heinemann), Lytton Strachey and Augustus John (both in Penguin); he is currently working on the authorised life of Bernard Shaw. He has edited The Genius of Shaw (Hodder & Stoughton) and The Art of Augustus John (Secker & Warburg). Unreceived Opinions (Heinemann) is his collection of essays. The author has been Chairman of the Society of Authors and Chairman of the National Book League. At present he is Vice-Chairman of the Arts Council's Literature Panel. Michael Holroyd has contributed to numerous magazines and newspapers, lectured in the USA, India and Britain as well as having written for radio and television. He is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature.
